

A word from Andrew - Lent 2025

This year we're asking everyone to read a daily testimony, each one from a different person around the country. It's called '40 Faces 40 Places' and it's from LICC (London Institute of Contemporary Christianity). Each one gives a different take on what whole-life discipleship means for them. Each one also contains a short bible passage, a reflection and a prayer. I've been checking it out and am thoroughly enjoying the insights and perspectives. The LICC exists to help Christians in the UK discover these 3 simple truths:

- Wherever we are, we can join in with what God is doing
- The tasks we do matter deeply to God
- · We can be fruitful in all kinds of ways

And you'll see immediately how '40 Faces 40 Places' helps us with all three. If you have the YouVersion App of the bible on your phone, you will find this 40-day study already there. Open up the plans section and put the name of this course in a search. Or you can receive it as a daily message to your inbox by going to **licc.org.uk** then go to 'resources' and then 'prayer journeys' and you can sign up for it there as a free resource.

You can do this as an individual study through the 40 days of Lent, but we are also encouraging Homegroups to use it in the meetings to gain experience from the previous week's entries.

Prayer

In the February's Revival meetings, we've been looking at Ephesians 3:20 'Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us.' I encourage you to listen to the talks 'God in a box 1 & 2' available on our website or Spotify.

One of the things we looked at was the power of 'collective imagination'. In the story of the Tower of Babel Genesis 11:6 God says, 'If as one people speaking the same language, they have begun to do this, then nothing they plan to do will be impossible for them'. Here, collective imagination (several people agreeing on a joint vision) is being misused/misapplied, but God understands its power, and it is huge. What if we had whole churches coming together in prayer meetings and having a vision which was like collective imagination. The power that is in collective imagination fuelled by the power of faith, would see a big vision realised. Would that give a reason to come to a church prayer meeting? God is looking for churches who believe in Him as a big God able to accomplish immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine!


